**A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF
REVENUE BONDS BY THE CARROLL COUNTY SOLID
WASTE AUTHORITY TO FINANCE SOLID WASTE
COLLECTION, RECYCLING AND TRANSFER
FACILITIES.**

WHEREAS, the Carroll County Solid Waste Authority (the "Authority") proposes to issue revenue bonds, not to exceed \$600,000.00 (the "Bonds") to finance the costs of solid waste collection, recycling and transfer facilities, including particularly, without limitation, roll-off containers, dumpsters, drop-off center site improvements, truck hoist and truck modifications, trailers, roll-off trucks and compaction trucks, expenses incidental thereto, any necessary reserves, expenses of issuing the Bonds and other costs of providing solid waste collection, recycling and transfer facilities; and

WHEREAS, the Four-County (NW) Regional Solid Waste Management Board has determined that such solid waste collection, recycling and transfer facilities will serve a proper need in Carroll County, Arkansas for solid waste management purposes;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Four-County (NW) Regional Solid Waste Management Board:

Section 1. That the issuance of the Bonds by the Authority to finance solid waste collection, recycling and transfer facilities is hereby authorized and is in all respects approved.

Section 2. That the Authority may pledge revenues of its solid waste system, which will include revenues from the facilities financed, to secure the repayment of the Bonds.

Section 3. That neither the Four County (NW) Regional Solid Waste Management District nor any of its revenues shall in any way be obligated on the said bonds.
